

Uniformed Law Enforcement in Frederick County



Frederick County Sheriff's Office (SROs)

Provides service to unincorporated areas of the County and those incorporated areas without municipal police departments. Resident Deputies in Towns of Middletown & Emmitsburg & Myersville(667 square miles).



Maryland State Police

Provides service to unincorporated areas of the County on state routes & interstates (some exceptions). Resident Troopers also patrol the town of Walkersville.



Frederick Police Department (SROs)

Provides service within the 23 square miles of the City of Frederick



Thurmont Police Department

Provides service within the Town of Thurmont



Brunswick Police Department (SRO)

Provides service within City of Brunswick



Mount Airy Police Department

FCSO SRO Program Mission



The School Resource Program is a service of the Frederick County Sheriff's Office (FCSO) that places a Deputy Sheriff in each Frederick County Public Schools (FCPS) high school feeder pattern to aid in creating and maintaining safe, secure, and orderly school environments for students, teachers and staff. The School Resource Officer (SRO) will serve as a law enforcement officer, instructor, counselor, and role model.

This program supports the Sheriff's Office commitment to service as it works to improve the quality of life in Frederick County, and specifically, the safety and security of the school system.



SRO Program Goals



- 1. Maintain a highly visible uniformed presence at assigned schools.
- 2. To increase crime prevention efforts targeted at students, staff and teachers.
- 3. To assist in identification of physical changes in the school environment that may reduce crime in and around the school.
- 4. To foster a working relationship between the Law Enforcement providers and the school community through positive interaction and alternative youth activities that seek to reduce crime.
- 5. To address crime and disorder problems, gangs, drug activity affecting the schools and the community at large.
- 6. To strengthen the larger crime reduction mission through gathering information in support of patrol operations, and criminal and narcotics investigations.
- 7. To promote school safety through enforcement of criminal and vehicle and traffic laws of the State of Maryland in and around Frederick County Public Schools.







Responding to School Based Threats

School and Workplace Safety – Behavior Threat Assessment: establishes procedures for assessment and intervention of individuals whose behaviors pose a threat to the safety of the school and work environment

School Threat Investigations



School Threat Investigations



Students investigated after hours need to be escorted to school by parents/guardians the following school day in most circumstances.*



EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT PROCEDURES

AVOID, DENY, DEFEND (Active Assailant)

STUDENTS

Avoid - rapidly move away from the danger

Deny - assist the teacher/adult in barricading the area (if appropriate); move to the "safe area of the room"; silence cell phones; identify secondary exits (if appropriate)

ADULTS

Avoid - rapidly direct students to move away from the danger

Deny - quickly secure and barricade doors; shades/blinds down, lights out, out of sight, quiet (silence all cell phones); move all students to the "safe area"; identify secondary exits

<u>Defend</u> – identify non-traditional weapons in the area and be prepared to utilize the same; understand that if engaged in Defend, there is still an opportunity for others to Avoid





HOLD! In your room or area. Clear the halls STUDENTS

Clear the hallways and remain in the room or area until "All Clear" is announced

Do business as usual

Confirm door is closed and locked Account for students and adults

Do business as usual



SECURE! Get inside. Lock outside doors. STUDENTS

Return to inside of building Do business as usual

ADULTS

ADULTS

Bring everyone indoors Lock outside doors Increase situational awareness Account for students and adults

Confirm door is locked and shut

Recover students from hallway (if possible)

Do business as usual

Turn out the lights Move away from sight

Do not open the door

Prepare to avoid or defend

Maintain silence



LOCKDOWN! Locks, lights, out of sight. STUDENTS

Move away from sight

Maintain silence Do not open the door

STUDENTS AND ADULTS:

When locking down is not an option, Avoid, Deny, Defend

EVACUATE! (A location may be specified) STUDENTS

Leave stuff behind if required to

If possible, bring your phone

Follow instructions

Account for students and adults Notify of missing, extra, or injured persons

ADULTS

Account for students and adults Notify of missing, extra, or injured persons



SHELTER! Hazard and safety strategy.

Use appropriate safety strategy for the hazard Hazard Safety Strategy Evacuate to shelter area Tornado

Reporting

Personal safety and school security concerns are most effectively and efficiently processed when reported to trusted adults.

Parents should directly notify school staff and/or law enforcement.

Report by phone or in person contact, not email or social media.

Reporting Suspicious Activity

To report suspicious activity, contact your local law enforcement agency.

Describe specifically what you observed, including:

- Who or what you saw;
- When you saw it;
- Where it occurred; and
- Why it's suspicious.

If there is an emergency, call 9–1–1.



IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

If you see something on social media:

- · Take a screen-shot and show it to an adult.
- Tell a teacher; tell an administrator; tell a school resource officer.
- Report it to police.
- Do not like, share, or re-post.

Don't contribute to the rumors.
